OUR FOODBANK



In late March, Saint Kentigern College students donated over 37,000 items to fill the shelves of our very bare Foodbank. A huge thank you Saint Kentigern College, a brilliant effort! Normally we distribute around 6,000 items to families each month, but like other foodbanks we have noticed a large spike in the number of requests. Each food parcel contains a minimum of 34 items. We are now heading into May and the colder months, and we know that the demand will increase. Thank you to all the churches and schools and individuals who make this service possible to families and individuals.

32 Y8 students from the three Saint Kentigern campuses and St Cuthbert's College came together at the Ruapotaka Marae in Glen Innes to learn and think more deeply about 'Child Poverty in NZ through the lens of 'Shalom' with its vision of peace, wellbeing and wholeness'. Students were encouraged to read the chapter on 'Child Poverty' from the Justice & Action booklet prior to the gathering.

The day was organised by Rev Sharon Ross Ensor, the Director of the Presbyterian Church Schools Resource Office, and Anne Overton, the Community Relationship Manager for Presbyterian Support Northern (PSN).

Daniel Hauraki, the GM of Māori for PSN was on hand to guide the students through the powhiri, a first for a number of students. The day started with a reflection on 'Shalom' by Rev Roxy Gahegan, and was followed by the 'People in Poverty' game. This has been developed by the Office of the Children's Commissioner to provide students with a better understanding of some of the root causes of child poverty.

IMAGINE.... A FAIRER START FOR EVERYONE

Poverty and prisoners seem to be creating awareness waves across NZ at the moment. We all need to be listening, thinking deeply about the issues and taking action. In Max Harris' book 'The New Zealand Project' he offers some good insights about our justice system and poverty. What resonated profoundly with me were the three key values he felt should underpin our NZ society: care, creativity and community. This led me to think about the different ways we as citizens can take action.

For many of us, the Charity Model which responds to the immediate needs and offers practical support is the easiest way for us to help. Help in the form of food, clothing, stationery and household items are excellent ways to assist families, but is there another way that will benefit the children and their families over the long term? This is where the Justice Model comes in.

the root causes of social problems.

Speaking with one of the team leaders for our Social Workers in Schools (SWiS) 'aspirational poverty' for school-aged children was highlighted as one of the greatest issue. We all need role models, we all need someone who believes in us and we all need people that we look up to. While research offers a number of view points, I believe we need to offer sound career options to all children and to start them on that journey earlier so that they take the subjects that will help them achieve their vision for their future.

In the meantime, we need to ensure that all children have adequate nutritious food, a warm dry house to live in, suitable clothes and shoes, and good opportunities to participate in society. The lecture series on 'Leaving Prison for Good', run by the Community of St Lukes in Remuera is a fine example of raising awareness and bringing greater understanding of the alternatives available to our current prison system.
