The group has organised regular clean-ups for Enliven clients who are living independently in their own homes but find major tasks like this too hard to manage by themselves. Anne Overton liaises with Enliven and Emma Page, youth coordinator for the Northern Presbytery, to get the work done.

Every few weeks, Emma asks Anne for more homes where Niu Souls can help out. Anne asks Eskaleen

Tooley, one of our Enliven service coordinators, for the names of Enliven clients who could so with some support. Eskaleen says it’s wonderful to know such help is available.

One older person said he and his wife thoroughly enjoyed the group’s visit. “They did an excellent job – a real credit to 21st century youth.”

WHAT'S ON YOUR WISH LIST?

"Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." (Matthew 25:40)

The impact of poverty on New Zealand children is devastating. Children do not choose to live in poverty, but many go without things that most of us take for granted, such as their own bed, warm clothes and enough food. Deprived of the basics, they may fail to thrive, leading to long term consequences for themselves, their families and the nation as a whole.

This issue is explored more fully in our Justice & Action booklet. Reading through the section on child poverty, I wondered what I could do that would make a difference.

Over the past few months I've been visiting some of our Family Works sites and asking the family workers, "What is on your wish list for the children, young people and families you are working with?"

It has been an enlightening experience and made me realise that if we all work together, even small acts of kindness can become significant blessings in the lives of others.

Below is a list of items that our workers know would bless children and families in need. The list is long but very achievable, if we work together.

A small number of churches have already helped out with baking, bike helmets, cots, bedding and household items but it would be great to have more names on the list. - ✓ Care packages for mums and dads
- ✓ Stationery packs
- ✓ Gumboots for children
- ✓ Funds for educational assessment for children with learning and behavioural disabilities
- ✓ Cots and bedding
- ✓ Cough medicine, head lice removal treatments
- ✓ Drinks and prepacked dry foods for hungry children with no school lunch.
