EXPRESSING LOVE IN OUR COMMUNITIES

Everyone at St Austell's Uniting Parish in New Lynn is involved in reaching out to the local community. Regular street clean-ups, weekly carwashes, window cleaning, and engaging with neighbours have become standard practice for all ages, from the Sunday School to men's and women's groups.

Initially, the thought of picking up rubbish around the local streets didn't really appeal to young participants. Now they look forward to it. Every month the men's group joins the Sunday School mission crew, all dressed in their high-vis vests and carrying black plastic rubbish bags. One young boy acts as the advance guard and rides on ahead to spot the rubbish. The streets are looking cleaner and more caredfor and the local community is taking notice.

The youth group offers homemade scones along with carwashes. What a treat! The young people use funds they've raised to pay for the renovation of the church hall floor and for their camps. On Mother's Day and Father's Day the car wash is free for local mums and dads.

Other initiatives include Christmas 'Carols in the Street', a Father's Day breakfast, gifts for residents of the local rest home, renovating the flats at the back of the church, water blasting, or helping with breakfast at the local school.
